

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Greetings fellow pilots and soaring enthusiasts!

Someone recently asked me "What is the Valley Soaring Association (VSA)", so I guess that's as good of a place as any to begin. I quote Peter Kelly from the VSA web page www.valleysoaring.net with the following description of our club and our mission:

VSA is an association of glider pilots organized simply to foster enjoyment in the sport of Soaring...... The sport of operating a glider, flying freely through the air, using only rising air currents to remain aloft after being towed or self-launching into the sky.

VSA SECOND ANNUAL WINTER SERIES

Sat November 15 VSA Winter Series Seminar # 1

Thanksgiving feast featuring Pete Kings famous smoked turkey with all the fixings

Seminar presented by Kempton Izuno, soaring pilot and producer of HD Video and Soaring

Kempton began soaring in 1974 with the Ames Club in Livermore, CA. His interest has always been in long cross country flights along with the associated logistics, piloting skills, weather forecasting and task setting. He currently flies an ASH-25 (partnership) and will soon have his longtime Libelle on the flightline.

Topic: Goose Lake Flight.

A Big Zig-Zag Across Northern California. On June 1, 2008, Kempton Izuno and Stefan Leutenegger attempted a 1000K flight to the north from Williams in the ASH-25, FNX. It was not the flight they expected, instead they covered new ground, getting slightly into Nevada before turning around. Kempton will review the flight with images and video, explain the basis for in-flight decisions and review the weather forecast vs. actual.

Seminar will be presented by Darryl Ramm. Darryl currently flies an ASH 26E based at Williams and holds the FAI silver and gold badges with diamonds for goal and distance.

Topic: Getting Your FAI Silver and Gold Badges and Diamonds

The FAI Silver and Gold badges and diamonds are great stepping-stones and goals to help motivate pilots to improve their cross-country flying skills. Working towards obtaining the FAI badges also provides pilots with knowledge useful in contests and record flights. This talk will try to encourage pilots, both new pilots and experienced cross-country pilots to try for their FAI badges. Darryl will review and discuss the authoritative (and useful) official rules and guides. He will show us some possible badge flights out of Williams and talk about IGC approved loggers, task declarations, official observer duties, etc. The talk will try to demystify common points of confusion including the 1% altitude rule, using FAI sector or cylinder style turn-points, logger calibration requirements, submitting flights for multiple awards, etc. and we will discuss how to make work easy for your official observer etc. This talk will not address the SSA A, B, C and bronze badges, which are an excellent pre-cross-country program. Student or pre-cross-country pilots should discuss the SSA badge program with an SSA flight instructor who can help you work through the program. 
